WELCOME TO SHEFFIELD FLOWERFEST 2024

Since the early 1900s, a local show has been staged in Sheffield. Those first shows were typical of a country fair showcasing local produce, animals, arts and crafts and a great deal more. In the early days, the highlight of the event was a dinner dance held on the Saturday night. The dance is celebrated in the Kentish Garden Club mural in Main Street, Sheffield.

In 2018 the show switched from spring to late summer and today FlowerFEST focuses on floral displays. It is held in the Sheffield Town Hall on the first weekend in February. As well as flowers there are potted plant displays, plant and produce stalls, a gardening bookstall and a mega raffle. Specific flower and plant exhibits include:



SHOW RULES AND CONDITIONS OF ENTRY

- 1. Floral and vegetable exhibits to be staged between 3pm–6pm on **FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 2** or 7.30am–8.30am on **SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 3**. Late entries will not be accepted for judging but may be exhibited at the Stewards' discretion.
- 2. Judging commences at 9am on **SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 3**. The judges' decision will be final. Awards are made on merit and the judges reserve the right to not make an award in any category.
- 3. All floral exhibits must be the property of, and be grown by the Exhibitor, except in Flower Arrangements where the exhibit MUST be designed and arranged by the Exhibitor.
- 4. Displays in the flower and foliage section (including 'In a Container') may not be wired for support but can use materials such as cotton wool to stage blooms but it must not show above the container.
- 5. The Stewards will direct Exhibitors on staging and will be of assistance if needed. All exhibits MUST have a white 'dot' attached, showing *Class number* on top, and *your exhibitor number* (see diagram below). All exhibits must have an exhibitor number.

- 6. Exhibits may not be removed until after the presentation of awards
- and prizes on Sunday, February 4 without the consent of the Stewards.
- 7. All exhibits not removed by 4pm on Sunday, February 4 will be disposed of.

FLOWERS AND FOLIAGE SHOW RULES

- 1. All exhibitors to supply own containers.
- 2. Entrants need an exhibitor number (see Show Rules and Conditions of Entry, see above).
- 3. Please NAME plants if possible or leave a label BLANK for naming.
- 4. Entries are judged primarily on the condition of flowers and foliage rather than arrangement.

FLOWERS

<u>Class No.</u>

- 1. 1 single stem of flowering annual
- 2. 1 single stem of flowering perennial
- 3. 1 single stem of flowering bulb, corm, rhizome or tuber (excluding dahlia)
- 4. 1 single stem of native flowering climber, shrub or tree
- 5. 1 single stem of flowering climber
- 6. 1 single stem of flowering shrub
- 7. 1 single stem of flowering tree

FOLIAGE

<u>Class No.</u>

- 8. 1 stem of foliage (no flowers or buds)
- 9. 1 stem of fruit tree (may be with or without fruit)
- 10. 1 single stem of foliage, may be with buds, seeds, new growth
- 11. 4 distinct stems of foliage (no flowers or buds)

HYDRANGEAS

<u>Class No.</u>

- 12. Single stem of a mop-head hydrangea
- 13. Single stem of a lace-cap hydrangea
- 14. Single stem of any other species of hydrangea

ROSES

<u>Class No</u>.

- 15. 1 single stem of rose (white or cream) 1 flower only
- 16. 1 single stem of rose (pink) 1 flower only
- 17. 1 single stem of rose (red) 1 flower only
- 18. 1 single stem of rose (orange-apricot) 1 flower only
- 19. 1 single stem of rose (yellow) 1 flower only
- 20. 1 single stem of rose (bi-colour) 1 flower only
- 21. 1 single stem of rose (any other colour) 1 flower only
- 22. 1 single stem of multi-headed rose (white or cream)
- 23. 1 single stem of multi-headed rose (pink)
- 24. 1 single stem of multi-headed rose (red)
- 25. 1 single stem of multi-headed rose (yellow, orange, apricot)
- 26. 1 single stem of multi-headed rose (bi-colour)
- 27. 1 single stem of multi-headed rose (any other colour)
- 28. 1 single stem of fragrant rose (any colour, single or multi-headed)
- 29. 1 single stem of Heritage Rose (any colour)

DAHLIAS

Special Kentish Garden Club member dahlia challenge (*open to members only***)** <u>Class No.</u>

30 Best bloom 'Wine and Roses' dahlia

<u>Class No. (</u>By variety (can be any colour)

- 31. Anemone 1 bloom
- 32. Ball 1 bloom
- 33. Large Cactus 1 bloom (210mm diameter and over)
- 34. Medium Cactus 1 bloom (160-210mm diameter)
- 35. Small Cactus 1 bloom (120-160mm)
- 36. Collarette 1 bloom
- 37. Large Decorative 1 bloom (210mm diameter and over)
- 38. Medium Decorative 1 bloom (160-210mm diameter)
- 39. Small Decorative 1 bloom (120-160mm diameter)
- 40. Miniature dahlia 1 bloom (Cactus or Decorative variety, 80-160mm diameter)
- 41. Pom Pom 1 bloom (50mm or under)
- 42. Pom Pom 3 blooms (50mm or under, displayed in one container)
- 43. Any other variety 1 bloom

IN A CONTAINER

Note: a container can be a vase, basket or any vessel with either water or florist foam <u>Class No.</u>

- 44. An arrangement of annuals in a container
- 45. An arrangement of perennials in a container
- 46. An arrangement of flowers from bulbs, corms, rhizomes or tubers (excluding dahlias) in a container not more than 24 stems
- 47. An arrangement of roses in a container not more than 10 stems
- 48. An arrangement of dahlias in a container not more than 10 stems
- 49. An arrangement of herbs in a container
- 50. An arrangement of natives in a container

GROWN IN A POT – FOLIAGE

Note: a pot can be any type of container filled with soil or potting mix <u>Class No.</u>

- 51. Pot of indoor foliage (not flowering)
- 52. Pot of cacti or succulents

GROWN IN A POT – FOLIAGE continued

Note: a pot can be any type of container filled with potting mix <u>Class No.</u>

- 53. Pot of ferns
- 54. Pot of herbs
- 55. Foliage begonia in a pot
- 56. Bonsai
- 57. Pot plant (not flowering) any kind not mentioned above

GROWN IN A POT – FLOWERING

Note: a pot can be any type of container filled with potting mix <u>Class No.</u>

- 58. Pot of flowering annuals
- 59. Pot of flowering perennials
- 60. Indoor potted plant in flower
- 61. Outdoor potted plant in flower (includes succulents)
- 62. Pot of orchids
- 63. Begonia
- 64. Fuchsia
- 65. Pot plant with flowers any kind not mentioned

FLOWER, FOLIAGE AND NOVELTY ARRANGEMENTS

Rules:

- 1. Artificial plant material may NOT be used.
- 2. Wiring is permitted. Plant material requiring water MUST be in water or florist foam.
- 3. Exhibits will be judged on originality, creative design and visual appeal and on the condition of flowers and foliage. Please read the Show Rules and Conditions of Entry (see page 4).

<u>Class No.</u>

- 66. Going for gold an arrangement inspired by the 2024 Paris Olympic Games
- 67. Perfect pastel
- 68. Posy of any type (for example flower, foliage or herbs)
- 69. Arrangement using weeds only
- 70. Arrangement in an unusual or novelty container
- 71. Children's garden an arrangement of flowers, foliage and decorative items by a child under 16

VEGETABLE AND FRUIT COMPETITION

Rules:

1. Entries must **only** contain produce from your garden or allotment. No purchased fruit or vegetables can be included.

<u>Class No.</u>

- 72. Strangest vegetable or fruit (may be any type of vegetable or fruit; display on a white paper plat approximately 25cm diameter)
- 73. Basket of vegetables (may include commonly grown vegetables such as tomato or zucchini, which are the fruit of the plant)
- 74. Basket of fruit (any fruit grown in your garden)

ABOUT KENTISH GARDEN CLUB

Kentish Garden Club meets at the Bible Chapel, 45 High Street, Sheffield, on the second Thursday of the month (except for May, June and July when meetings are held on the Saturday after the second Thursday from 2pm Barrington Hall, Barrington Road, Barrington, and in December when we hold a Christmas party on the Sunday after the second Thursday). During daylight savings time (October–March), meetings commence at 7.30pm, preceded by a local garden visit. During the non-daylight-saving period (April to September), meetings commence at 6.30pm.

Meetings include a guest speaker, formal agenda with a section on 'What's your problem?' and a look at blooms of the month. The formal meeting is followed by supper, which is a great time to talk with fellow garden club members.

Throughout the year the Club also arranges weekend workshops and demonstrations, along with garden visits to areas such as the North West coast and Launceston. There's also a Harvest Supper (April), where members contibute food based on local harvests, and an annual dinner for the August meeting is held in one of Sheffield's restaurants. Our annual Christmas Party is a weekend lunch and includes a garden visit.

Annual membership, which is due on July 1, is \$20.00 per year per person. We welcome new members, so why not join the Garden Club and meet those in the community with a common interest in gardening.
